## Robert York a Hit with Nosferatu

Robert York has informed me that his Old Town Music Hall performance of the silent film cult classic Nosferatu was a sold out event, in the process introducing the organ to many people who had never been properly exposed to it. In Robert's own words:

The 1921 mighty Wurlitzer at the Old Town Music Hall actually came from the Fox West Theatre that was located at 333 Ocean Blvd. The 2200 seat movie palace was demolished in 1987 and the Westin hotel is now in that location.

The program on Saturday, April 9th began with jazz piece played on their 9' Bosendorfer Imperial grand piano, followed by a novelty piece, Canadian Capers, on the organ to demonstrate the bells, car horns, boat whistles, drums and such. The organ pipes are visible when the curtain is open and thanks to wild black-light paint the audience can observe the mallets strike the marimba, glockenspiel and all the rest.

Robert received a standing ovation and hopefully the enthusiastic newcomers to live organ will return on May 22nd to see *Blood and Sand*, starring Valentino.

Whether heard in a cathedral, church, or a theatre, the more people we can introduce to the King of Instruments, the better!

To Robert's last paragraph, I can only add concert halls and even parks (e.g., the Spreckels Austin, in San Diego's Balboa Park, within easy walking distance of the Zoo) as possible venues for bringing the organ to new audiences. In my years as a subscriber to the Organ Recital series at Disney Hall, I've seen more than a few people's reactions to hearing the Rosales/Glatter-Götz there for the first time, and the Spreckels Organ Society is renowned for its youth programs.

Blood and Sand, the 1922 film adaptation of the novel by Victor Blasco Ibáñez, stars Rudolph Valentino as a young bullfighter caught in a love triangle. You might want to note it on your calendar, for May 22nd, at the historic Old Town Music Hall,located at 140 Richmond Street, El Segundo, CA 90245, not far from the Los Angeles International Airport.

### In Memoriam

LB chapter member Jim Kistler's wife of nearly 45 years, Margarita, died unexpectedly on March 25. Her funeral Mass was held at Historic St. Isidore's church in Los Alamitos where her father had been the organist, she had been baptized, and she and Jim had been married. Church Keyboard Center provided an organ for the service. LB chapter member Peter Bates was the organist.

I've also been informed that Michael Fisher, organist/music director at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in the 1980s and early 1990s, and LBAGO Chapter Dean from 1991 to 1993 has passed away. Unfortunately, I have no details as of press time.

As I type this, I'm digesting a fairly elaborate turkey dinner (a welcome change after a month of Lent!), following a busy morning, attending four Easter services (two in person, two streamed and time-shifted), each in a different church, of a different denomination, starting at "zero-dark-thirty" with the Easter Vigil from St. Mark's Cathedral, in Seattle. I sincerely hope all of you had a pleasant and meaningful Easter.

April has not (other than Holy Week and Easter) been quite so eventful a month as March, although pianist Lang Lang did perform the complete Goldberg Variations at Disney Hall, and Itzhak Perlman's rescheduled recital there was as magnificent as usual.

May, on the other hand, will be a busy month. In addition to the Guild Service on the 1st, Dr. Hwang's recital on the 15th, and Robert's silent movie on the 22nd, pianist Daniil Trifonov will be closing out the Colburn 1 series at Disney Hall, with a program of Szymanowski, Debussy, Prokofiev, and Brahms on the 3rd, and organist Nathaniel Gumbs will be closing out the Organ Recital series on the 29th, with an exceptionally eclectic program. And for me, it will be even more eventful, as I'm planning a vacation (which could very likely make this, sadly, the first Neighborhood Church recital I will have missed in many years.)


