Dr. Frederick Swann

July 30, 1931 - November 13, 2022

A memorial service for Dr. Frederic Swann will be held Wednesday, January 25, 2023, at 10:30 a.m., at St. Margaret's Episcopal Church in Palm Desert. The service will begin with a 30-minute organ preludes honoring Dr. Swann's illustrious career as an organist. 

From the New York Times: "Frederick Swann, who in churches on the East Coast and the West played some of the world's grandest organs, performing classical and religious works on the complex instruments with sensitivity and technical skill, died on November 13 at his home in Palm Desert, California. He was 91. The cause was cancer, said Karen McFarlane Holtkamp, who was Mr. Swann's secretary in the 1960s and '70s and then his concert manager.

"Mr. Swann was well known in New York as organist and music director at Riverside Church in Manhattan, where he began playing in the 1950s. In 1982 he reached a much wider audience when he moved to the Crystal Cathedral in Garden Grove, home base of the Rev. Robert H. Schuller, the television evangelist. There he appeared each week on "Hour of Power," one of the most widely watched religious programs in the country, with a viewership in the millions...."

From the Press Room

As I type this, part of a flower bed in my front yard remains flooded, and my hopes of finishing taking down the Christmas lights next weekend are rather dim, but things are certainly worse elsewhere: last night's evening news interrupted by automaed Emergency Alert System warnings of possible flash-flooding in Long Beach, and tonight's evening news showing rockslides, mudslides, and a sinkhole that caught two cars. I hope that nobody here has been flooded out of their homes, churches, or cars.

Even without any official Chapter events, December was a busy month. Then again, it always is, no doubt the reason for the lack of any official Chapter events. Of the three Member events promoted, I attended only the first one, the Christoph Bull/I-Chin Lee event at First Lutheran of Torrance. The preceding Wednesday, I'd received my second COVID booster shot (Omicronoptimized), and I'd taken the Thursday and Friday off, so that I could recover from the aftereffects (I have a rather robust immune system, producing robust aftereffects), do some Linotype maintenance at the Museum, and attend the concert. Dr. Bull and Ms. Lee did not disappoint.

The Rolling Hills UMC event was simply too far away to be practical for me; I sincerely hope it went well, and that the mention in the December issue brought in a few more people. As to Peter's event at Covenant, that was the afternoon when I donned a safety harness and climbed onto the garage roof, to put up the year's final installment of Christmas lights.

This year's Presidents' Day Organ Festival has a couple of personal connections. A very dear friend of mine, The Rev'd Allison English, was an Associate at All Saints', before moving on to become Rector of Calvary Clifton Episcopal in Cincinnati. And their small Winfried Banzhaf positive (listed as the "Chamber Organ" on the web site is a near duplicate (unless the date listed is wrong) of a Winfried Banzhaf positive that was used in a 1987 Orange County Chamber Orchestra concert (for the "Albinoni" Adagio of Remo Giazotto).

It is rather a shame that we have had to cancel the PPP event we'd planned for February. But the cancelation

should be a learning experience as well. Permit me to illustrate with a series of events involving the aforementioned Orange County Chamber Orchestra.

I was the self-styled "Last Founder" of OCCO. I was literally that: the deadline for founding contributions had passed, but Maestro Micah Levy, knowing my friendship to the Orchestra, and my financial situation, held the Founders' Circle open past the deadline for me, and me alone, and in 1988, when my finances had improved, I made, and fulfilled my Founder's pledge. At any rate, in 1994, Maestro Levy received an out-of-state offer that was too good to pass up. A conducting fellowship, I think it was.

Micah wasn't just the Conductor of the OCCO. He wasn't just the Music and Artistic Director. In many ways, he was the OCCO. He ran everything. And without him, the Orchestra barely made it through a single season under Diana Halprin, before it simply collapsed, because Maestro Levy simply hadn't created a structure that could survive without him.

That's what happened with our February PPP event. It was too dependent upon one person. We should do our best to avoid making anything entirely dependent upon a single person. This newsletter is an example. A few years ago, when it was announced that we needed somebody else to do *The Principal*, I was able, after a single issue that Dolly put together, to jump in on very short notice. And there is no doubt in my mind that if I were suddenly unable to continue producing *The Principal*, somebody else would be able to jump in.
