

The General

James H. H. Lampert

Sunday evening at 5 PM was our showing of *The General*, at Our Savior's Lutheran, with live organ accompaniment by our former Chapter Dean, Robert York, at the Mighty Reuter.



Probably anybody who's ever set foot in the California State Railroad Museum has at least seen clips of it (at least one scene is incorporated into the long-running orientation film, Evidence

of a Dream, and I think it's a loop of highlights they have running in the Roundhouse Gallery). But I've never seen it all the way through.

In a nutshell, an action-adventure-slapstick comedy (with just a hint of romance) concerns locomotive engineer Johnnie Gray (Buster Keaton) and his girlfriend, Annabelle Lee (Marion Mack). When word is received of the attack on Fort Sumter, Annabelle's

father and brother rush off to enlist in the Confederate Army. To please Annabelle, Johnnie tries to enlist, but is turned away, without explanation (because he's more valuable to the South as an engineer than as a soldier).

Union spies steal his locomotive ("The General"), still attached to a baggage car with Annabelle on board, and



Johnnie gives chase, first on foot, then by handcar, then by bicycle, then in another locomotive (inadvertently leaving behind a flatcar loaded with troops). Over the course of the film, he rescues Annabelle (who turns out



to be not half-bad at firing and running a locomotive, for a beginner), interferes with the Union spies' campaign of sabotage, and then returns to the Southern lines, capturing a Union officer in the process, and getting a field commision as a Lieutenant.

Robert's accompaniment, like all of his silent film accompaniments, was a well-planned, well-rehearsed improvisation. It was also a triumph of both chops and endurance, involving nearly an hour and a half of nonstop playing (even a recitalist gets time to breathe between movements, and likewise, the masters of improvisation we call the Preservation Hall Jazz Band don't have to keep it up, nonstop, for over an hour). He also has a good ear for railroad sounds, not only the whistle, but also the exhaust chuffs (cluster-chords in the bass, an "orage" effect).

As to the film itself, while it was told from a Southern point of view, and accordingly romanticized that point of view, it at least didn't romanticize slavery (indeed, it essentially ignored that whole matter). Of more interest was its very accurate treatment of railroading, ancient link-and-pin couplers and all. I would not want to be a railroad brakeman in the days before George Westinghouse invented the air brake, and Eli Janney invented the automatic coupler.

The program was fairly well attended, which is not especially easy in a part of town with narrow streets and very limited parking.



November has been a busy month. After the rush to get the November issue out the door by the end of October, despite a nearly empty toner cartridge (and thank you very much Peter, for getting me the promotional piece and flyer on *The General*, and the coverage of Bruce Neswick's appearance so quickly, and also Dr. Hwang for getting me the Dean's Corner, the Neswick pictures, and the revisions to the event schedule) the month began with Isabelle Demers at Disney Hall, in a performance that ran a gamut from

Bach to Heiller, and included three of Alkan's *Douze études pour les pieds seulement* (which amounted to eleven minutes of non-stop spectacular pedal solos).

The following weekend brought the Chapter's November event, with our own Robert York accompanying *The General*, which I've already covered. Unfortunately, it was followed by something rather less pleasant: if you attended, you may have noticed police activity on Junipero, following the show. My car was involved: there was a hit-and-run, and my 2018 Leaf got tweaked. As I type this, it is in a body shop in Cerritos, after I had to personally move it from the body shop where it had been left, by mistake, by a tow truck driver who'd been given the wrong destination.

Then, on Tuesday evening, after delivering my car to the *correct* body shop, I attended what is almost certainly the strangest concert I've attended in many years. *Electric Fields*, a newly commissioned work for soprano, two pianos, live electronics, and live visual projections had its world premiere at Disney Hall. Strange, yet after what I'd been through over the previous five days, it was remarkably soothing.

As this issue goes to press, I find much for which to be thankful. I've got a time estimate on my car repairs, and a rental car that doesn't smell like an ashtray, and an appointment for an Omicron-optimized COVID-19 booster shot, on a day that actually works for me. And before this issue is mailed, I'll have a traditional Thanksgiving dinner. Would that all the world could be so fortunate.


