The Franck Recital

Our March event went very well, and was well-received, already up to 108 views in just under a week. Camerawork and editing were quite good, worthy of my friend in the video business.

The program itself was very well-structured, starting with one of Franck's best known and most frequently performed works, and ending with a "big finish."

Piece Heroique and Prelude, Fugue, and Variations were of course very familiar to me, and Sean and Alicia's performances were both up to the same standards as any of the recordings I have of those pieces.

The Cantabile and the Symphonic Variations were both entirely new pieces to me, so I have nothing to compare them to, but Robert, Althea, and Peter also performed beautifully. I will note (for the benefit of others who are unfamiliar with the work, and who missed the intertitle card) that this is originally for piano and orchestra.

Yes, We Have Nosteratu!

Our immediate Past Dean, Robert York, will be accompanying a screening of the 1922 silent film, Nosferatu, on April 9th, at 7pm. Tickets are \$20. This will be Robert's debut at the historic Old Town Music Hall,located at 140 Richmond Street, El Segundo, CA 90245, not far from the Los Angeles International Airport. The theatre has been going for 50 years and houses a huge 4-manual "Mighty Wurlitzer."

Robert will be accompanying Nosferatu on their 4m/27r Wurlitzer. I saw the film some years ago myself, accompanied by Robert on the St. Luke's Austin.

This is F. W. Murnau's unauthorized version of Dracula, that the Bram Stoker estate tried to suppress forever (and almost succeeded).

From the Press Room

James Lampert, Production and Distribution

For the first time in a while, we've managed to get an issue out the door on time, i.e., before the beginning of its nominal month. But can we do it twice in a row? Given that the Guild Service is on May 1st, we'd certainly better do so!

March was a busy month. Before the Franck recitalwas even uploaded, there was Monica Czausz Berney's long-awaited recital at Disney Hall. Ms. Berney is even better in person than in her YouTube videos; in both the pre-concert lecture and when she addressed the audience during the concert, she turned out to be personable and witty. The lecture took place in the hall itself (because of an art installation in the usual pre-concert lecture space), which allowed her to demonstrate excerpts on the organ itself.

And that was followed, barely three days later, by a violin recital featuring Midori, with pianist Özgür Aydin, in a program of Mozart, Schumann, Bach, Skalkottas, and Brahms. The structure of the program was nearly ideal, getting the audience completely on Midori's side before venturing out of the comfort zone with the Skalkottas, and then returning everyonehome with the Brahms.

CD of the Year, 2021

It has occurred to me that I never did announce the 2021 Christmas "CD of the Year." As always, I was looking for a new-release, new-import, or otherwise newly-in-wide-distribution CD, prominently featuring an organ of at least predominantly real pipes and predominantly tracker key action, with mass appeal, and what I like to call "Tracker Action on Parade." This time, the auditions ultimately boiled down to two finalists: December 1705, Manuel Tomadin's volume of Buxtehude and Bach on a 1691 Arp Schnitger, on Brilliant Classics, and Wonderful Splendor, a more eclectic program by Russell Weismann on the Pittsburgh Beckerath, on Raven.

The Tomadin recording had much to recommend it, but with only two composers represented, its variety was a bit limited. The Weismann recording ended up taking the nod (and a sizable order for Christmas) on the strength of its variety, including both familiar and rarely heard works, including a few that are far from



stereotypical material for performance on a tracker instrument.
